From the desk of the Parish Priest Fr Declan

Over the past century much debate has centred on the thought of three outstanding figures, Charles Darwin, Sigmund Freud and Karl Marx, whom some have called "the unholy trinity." They pushed us into the modern world, often in spite of our protests. Darwin's theory of evolution was greeted with howls of derision by the established churches, and had to battle for recognition. Freud opened up the universe of the unconscious and profoundly affected conventional attitudes. The social theories of Karl Marx have dominated almost half the world and considerably influenced the other half. Of the three, only Darwin's theory of evolution remains fairly intact. The developed world has largely discredited Marx and the theories of Freud are more and more contested. Time has taken its toll of "the unholy trinity."

The Holy Trinity, whose feast we celebrate today, is outside the reach of time and beyond the grasp of human reasoning. It is a mystery of our faith. We can only fumble in the dark in search of glimmers of light. "Two is company, three is a crowd" is a popular expression. The gospel would have it otherwise. There, the figure three symbolises completeness and perfect symmetry, and re-appears at all the key moments of the Christ story.

The life of Christ constantly reflected the Trinity. Three figures make up the nativity scene in Bethlehem — the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Their first visitors were the three wise men. Later, in the desert preparing to begin his public life, Jesus was tempted three times by the devil. A good story should have a beginning, a middle and an end. Christ was a storyteller par excellence and three figures prominently in his parables. The Prodigal Son is about a father and his two sons; the Good Samaritan tells of the three passers-by, the priest, the Levite and the Samaritan; the sower sowed his seed in three kinds of soil, yielding three kinds of harvest. The crucifixion scene has three figures, Christ between two thieves. Before his resurrection, he spent three days in the tomb.

God is love. There are Three Persons in the Trinity, the Father the Son and the Holy Spirit. Together they represent the fullness of love. The Father loves the Son, the Son loves the Father. The Holy Spirit is their love for each other. We are made in the image of a triune God. God the Father, who created us, his Son who saved us, and the Holy Spirit who continues to guide us. Our lives should reflect the Trinity. We should be always creative like the Father, compassionate like his Son, and dispose our talents in the service of others like the Holy Spirit...

History of the Eucharist

People excluded (part 1)

Many people could no longer understand the mass regardless of whether it was in Greek and Latin, so singing became popular. In time, choirs took over singing the 'Kyrie' and such acclamations while the priest who was at the other end of the Basilica (without microphones) began to speak quietly since he could not be heard anyway. In time theologians came to rationalise this by suggesting the priest was in this 'holy place' where reverence was demanded. This silent prayer remained until 1965.

The priest was praying silently usually in a foreign language, with his back to the people who had ceased to be participants. In time statues and devotional prayers like the rosary helped people pray during the Mass. Following the Arian heresy and the developing notion that man is a sinner and God an almighty judge, it began to be questioned 'how is Jesus present?' One teacher suggested that it was symbolic presence and that the body of Jesus was obviously not a real corporal body, yet he was present. The students of Realism said in response 'if He isn't present in human form He must be present as judge'. This affected how people participated in the meal.

Prior to this development everybody shared in the meal—even babies. If God was judge of the world (with the obvious overtones of man being sinful) how would he judge the baby who could not keep down the bread? It was ordered that there must be a knowledge of what one is doing—an 'age of reason' for receiving Eucharist, which came to be 18-24 years of age. In furthering the idea of being worthy to receive this almighty judge, one suggestion was made that confession was necessary prior to receiving communion. At this time penances were extreme and confession was received only once in a life time, so many waited until they through death was near before making their confession in order to avoid the harsh penances. This meant that they could not take part in communion.

In some places people were encouraged to receive communion either before or after Mass, but only the priest received communion during the Mass. This meant that the original sharing meal had become a meal for one person! The use of a foreign language prevented people's involvement in the Mass. In this worship, the priest 'says' Mass, the people 'follow' 'attend' 'hear' or 'go to' Mass. None of this language denoted sharing as central to what was happening. People went about 'saying their prayers' while the priest prayed the Mass. There was no sign of a meal. (continued next week)
