Before I came to Australia, I worked in a parish in rural Ireland that drew its members in part from a rural farming area. Folks who work on a farm usually used to attend the earliest Sunday Mass. They were a fascinating congregation to work with. I'm only guessing, but I wonder if their openness to the word of God has anything to do with their connection to the earth. The cycle of growing, the passage of seasons, the risks of planting crops-all these activities teach a lot about life.

Perhaps that's why the Scriptures use farming images so frequently. Today's first reading describes the fertility of the word of God. It bears fruit, watered by rain and snow. In the Gospel Jesus tells the famous parable of sower and seed to describe how the word comes to people and how they receive it.

I wonder how people who labor with seed and soil will hear these Scriptures this Sunday? Would they caution us to let go of our fears about ministry, and trust in the fruitful working of God's word? Will they remind us to be tolerant of ourselves when our receptiveness of the seed of the word is less than perfect? Would they encourage us to rejoice when God's word bears fruit? Maybe it's time to get our own hands dirty in the soil of the word! Fr. D

The Eucharist as Sacrament

It is common to hear people ask 'What does a Sacrament do?' this mentality seeks to know the effects of the action. (e.g. how is a person different afterwards?) It seeks to clarify what matter or material is needed in order to create this nominated effect. (e.g. what type of oil is necessary for Baptism?) It also wants to know what is the minimum required for the effect to take place.

A better question to ask is 'What does a Sacrament mean?' this question focuses on the people and why they are doing what they are doing. If we ask ' what are we doing at the Eucharist?' we can say we are eating food and drinking wine. If we ask 'what does it mean?' we discover that we are remembering Jesus as he asked us to do, and praising and thanking God.

What are we doing at a wedding reception? What are we doing at a Christmas meal? In both cases we are eating food, but we are saying something different on each occasion. The meaning is different although the external action is the same. So with our understanding of the Eucharist. What does it mean? Who is the focus? In the new rite of infant Baptism it is not the baby, but the parents who are the focal point. They are being asked if they are willing to accept the responsibility of bringing up this baby within a Christian environment. The Godparents represent the community which supports the parents in this charge. In adult Baptism it is the adult candidate who is the focus because this person is accepting the 'new direction' of following Jesus Christ and belonging to the Church.

In the Eucharist we share food and say 'Yes' to Jesus, which draws us into deeper communion with Him and with one another. The real mystery is that we, though many, are one body, (the body of Christ). We are responsible for communicating the life of Jesus to each other in the world. The sacrament highlights this reality and celebrates it. In sharing the meal we 'remember ' that what Jesus has done for us he is doing for us now. The Eucharistic signs are not just bread and wine but eating and drinking, what we say about the objects we say also about the people-we are the body of Christ. We are called to be bread for others as Jesus is bread for us. We have to build up the body.

In this sacrament the Christians assemble in a festive action to celebrate their lived experience and to call to mind their common story of God's love and blessing. This action is a sign of God's care and the action enriches our fellowship to one another in the community and with Jesus who is present with us.
